Introduction

This Primary Care Network (PCN) Self-Assessment has been created by the Indigenous Primary Health Care Council (IPHCC) in consultation with the Ministry of Health and Ontario Health to support PCNs with fostering appropriate and reciprocal partnerships with Indigenous-governed organizations, individuals, and communities.

The goal of this self-assessment is to create awareness of Indigenous initiatives within the health care system with respect to PCNs and Ontario Health Teams. This work will help the PCN understand where they currently sit with respect to Indigenous cultural safety, competency, and sovereignty with the overarching goal of closing any gaps to ensure health care planning and service delivery is safe, appropriate, accessible, and of high quality for First Nations, Inuit, and Metis (FNIM) Peoples.

Instructional Guide for Using the PCN Self-Assessment:

This guide is designed to assist you in effectively using the tool to assess the development and integration of your Primary Care Network (PCN) as it progresses toward defined goals. The tool is focused on five key Foundations, each with three levels of maturity. These levels help evaluate the current state of the PCN with respect to Indigenous considerations and participation on PCN activities. The toolkit also provides direction and insight to help advance to a more mature state by offering insights into where further support and development may be necessary.

In-Progress: The PCN is actively engaging in efforts to integrate Indigenous cultural awareness and competency into its practices. This includes tangible steps such as training, policy changes, and community outreach. 2	Level 2: At this level, the PCN is actively incorporating learning and developments from the discovery phase. The PCN is taking actionable steps toward deepening its commitment and advancing within the foundation’s core principles.				
3	Level 3: At this level, the PCN has fully integrated Indigenous cultural awareness, respect, engagement, competency, and sovereignty. This level signifies that the PCN has achieved a high standard of cultural competency and inclusion, and these principles are sustainable and evolving.				



How to Use This Assessment Effectively

1. **Complete the assessment for each foundation:** Review each foundation and consider your PCN's current maturity level and rating based on the descriptions above.
2. **Provide supporting narrative:** Provide a detailed narrative for each level, that describes your PCN's progress, the actions taken, challenges faced, and any gaps identified.
3. **Evaluate and Plan Next Steps:** After assessing each foundation, consider the following questions:
 - What are the next steps required to move to the next level of maturity?
 - Where does your PCN need further support or resources to advance in its cultural competency and inclusion journey?
 - Are there any barriers preventing progress, and how can they be overcome?
4. **Collaborate with IPHCC:** Share your assessment and narrative responses with the IPHCC. The information will help identify areas where additional support or resources may be necessary and enable IPHCC tailor assistance to your specific PCN's needs and goals.

Conclusion

This tool is designed to guide your PCN through each stage of growth, and help achieve a higher standard of cultural competency and Indigenous inclusion. By using the tool effectively, you will gain valuable insights into your PCN's strengths, identify areas for improvement, and build a more inclusive, culturally competent healthcare system for Indigenous communities.

PCN Self-Assessment tool helps PCNs evaluate their current practices, identify strengths, and pinpoint areas for improvement in cultural competence and inclusion. By using this tool, PCNs gain insights that enable them to better serve Indigenous communities.

ICS OHT ACTION Framework provides a structured, six-step approach to assess and improve Indigenous cultural safety within Ontario Health teams (OHTs). The framework is designed to help OHTs develop a comprehensive plan, identify gaps in cultural safety, and track progress over time to ensure accountability.
